#### **Blue Star Memorial**



The Garden Club of Indiana's Blue Star Memorial has had a good 2019. Our donations for the Blue Star Memorial Fund were \$1,145.00 for the year total. Those funds are available to help Indiana garden clubs with funds for Blue Star Memorial markers and Blue Star Memorial land-scapes projects. I encourage clubs to make the commitment to set a Blue Star Memorial marker in your town or county. Our Armed Forces need a visible reminder that we are grateful for their service in the past and especially in 2020.

Two new Blue Star Memorial markers were set in 2019. We have Boonville Garden Club's new Blue Star Memorial marker to be set in the warmer weather in 2020. I will keep you informed as to the date and time selected for their dedication ceremony.

The Garden Club of Indiana will be working to rectify the I-70 East rest stop Blue Star Memorial which has fallen out of the responsibility of a local garden club. We will be contacting a local landscape company for their help in cleaning it out and planting it with shrubs and river rock. The Blue Star Memorial marker gardens send messages to families and veterans and must be kept up to show our respect.

Two clubs have applied for Blue Star Memorial Awards at the State level and possibly to be moved on to the National Garden Club level. Broadripple Garden Club received an award from Central Region for their marker setting and dedication ceremony in 2019. As you plant your gardens with Suffragist Centennial flowers and colors, please take pictures to document your ongoing projects or new planting projects. Our Awards Chairmen and I will work with you to see you get the recognition for your club patriotic efforts. Keep your local news and media outlets informed of your efforts. Share, share, share so the word is out that our federated garden clubs are impacting the communities and would indeed love to have new members.

#### President's Project for 2019 – 2021 "Plant America With More Members"

<u>"Go & Grow Award"</u> - A \$100 award will be given yearly in every district to the club with the largest number percentage-wise of members in attendance at their district meetings. The District Director will determine whether the spring or fall district meeting is more appropriate for the award. In districts where one club is the host club, it will be ineligible for the award that year. In districts where multiple clubs are responsible, all clubs will be eligible. The District Directors will submit the attendance record from the meeting. The Membership chair (2<sup>nd</sup> VP) will determine the club winners and announce them at the state convention. District Directors can then take the awards back to their meetings to distribute.

New member *gift* - Every month, clubs with new members (as evidenced by receipt of dues for current year) will have their club names placed in a "bowl" - one ticket for each new member. At the end of the month, the President's Project Committee will draw 3 names and a \$25 *gift* will be awarded to each winning club. Those clubs not drawn each month will remain in the bowl for future possible *gifts*.

<u>21% by '21</u> - The membership challenge from the NGC President Gay Austin is to increase membership "21% by '21." With this in mind, the districts, which have increased their membership by 21% or more by the end of President Leverett's term in 2021, will receive a \$100 award.

## Plant America With Trees - Each One Plant One

National Garden Club members are encouraged to reach out to members of their communities in the "Plant America with Trees" effort as we hope to plant at least 165,000 trees in each year of the 2019-2021 administration. All it takes is for "Each One" (member) to "Plant One" (native tree).

The National Garden Club initiative, "Plant America with Trees": Each One Plant One reaches far beyond the physical planting of trees. Increasingly, studies are finding that climate change understandably causes depression. Not only are even the best prospects pretty grim but the large scale of problems can be overwhelming. For example, planting 165,000 trees in one year, and the example this sets in our communities, can be empowering.

Even planting a single tree in a small garden provides an opportunity to talk with neighbors about choosing a tree, planting a tree and nurturing that tree. However large or small your tree-planting project may be, it is important to look for ways to incorporate community education into your plans.

Report your tree planting to our Indiana Tree Chair, Laura Kearby, <u>laurakearby@hotmail.com</u>, and let's see our many native trees Indiana can plant by 2021.

#### What's new with Land Trust??

After a highly successful year of wonderful donations from you and your clubs, we have been able to retire the project of the butterfly trail at Kankakee Sands preserve. As you saw in an earlier report this was two years ahead of schedule and all due to great enthusiasm of The Garden Club of Indiana, Inc. and members. **THANK YOU ALL.** 

Now it is time for a new project. At the December board meeting a couple of different options were presented and with great excitement, the following was adopted as our next Land Trust project.

We are going to divert for a couple of years to partner with Central Indiana Land Trust, Inc. for a specific project. This new project will entail our purchase of trees (roughly 14000 of them) to be planted at property adjacent to Meltzer Woods in Shelby County. Meltzer Woods is a property already under management by CILTI (Central Indiana Land Trust) and had true old growth forest - one of very few stands left in Indiana. Having hiked there several times, I can only tell you how amazing and wonderful it is. By the way, it is open to the public and you may want to take your garden club there for a hike this spring!

So, the new project: CILTI is working on finalizing the purchase of farmland adjacent to the property with the intention of planting it with Indiana natives to reestablish a forest similar to what would have once been there. Our part will be covering the cost of the trees. Needless to say (it's trees) I am very excited about this project. It also coincides nicely with the National Garden Club effort to "Plant America" and specifically their challenge to plant trees during this administration. Whether we will qualify to apply for the grant or award likely will depend on timing, but regardless we are aligned nicely with a fabulous win win project!

So, once again, I will try to motivate you all to consider donations to Land Trust as you prepare you annual budgets. Everyone wins when we work with nature!

He won his first design competition at the age of 15 when he competed against professional florists in the Indiana State Florists Association convention in Indianapolis, winning several trophies and ribbons in 4 categories.

John has won 60 national and international design awards, including FTD's Designer of the year twice, Teleflora's Designer of the Year twice, third place in the America's Cup and Illinois State Florists' Association Designer of the Year. John was Education Chairman for the FTD District 5 A and B (northern Illinois/Chicago) for many years and was elected to American Institute of Floral Designers. His design work is published in several countries and has helped over 4000 brides celebrate their wedding days.

John became a member of Petal & Stem Garden Club 3 years ago when he moved to Richmond from Denver. John spends his days working in his yard and home, reading, painting, and giving his dog, Mitzi Louise with the Hairy Knees, her daily sausage muffin. When John counts his blessings, he counts the members of Petal & Stem Garden Club twice.

#### "Rumba with your Rakes"

#### After Carol Michel tells us about Gardening Tools Beyond the Hoe

Carol J. Michel is the award-winning author of a trilogy of gardening humor books and one children's book. With degrees in horticulture and computer technology, she spent over three decades making a living in healthcare IT while making a life in her garden.

I consider myself a gardenangelist, an evangelist for gardening who loves gardening and wants others to love it, too. (Yes, I made up that word!)

I've been gardening in some capacity my entire life, starting as a toddler following behind my dad as he planted peas every spring. I wore out the gardening books at my local library by checking them out repeatedly. And there still might be a spoon or two - my childhood digging tool of choice - buried in the backyard. Carol is also the keeper of the world's largest hoe collection.

Her awards have come from several organizations, including GardenComm; Garden Communicators International; National Federation of Press Women; and National Society of Newspaper Columnists. Her library is a sanctuary for old gardening books. You will be looking forward to working with your tools and *Dancing with Nature*.

### "Jitterbug Jitterbug" Judy and Wayne after telling us about BUGS: The Good, the BAD and the UGLY.

You will remember **Judy Burris** and **Wayne Richards** from their entertaining and educational Monarch Butterflies program at the Wildflower Workshop in Marion 5 years ago. Judy and Wayne live in northern Kentucky just across the Ohio River from Cincinnati and are coming to Indiana to educate us about bugs.

They are Naturalists sister-brother authors and photographer team. As adults, their childhood interest in animal and plant life has translated into a nearly full-time devotion to gardening, specifically to support butterflies in every stage of their development, and photographing these miraculous creatures in our own backyard butterfly gardens.

They enjoy teaching others about flower gardening, nature photography and butterfly life cycles. Over the years they have also documented the life cycles of many other insects including lightning bugs, giant silk moths, ladybugs, lace wings, praying mantis, and others so they decided to write a book about those.

The Secret Lives of Backyard Bugs won the National Outdoor Book Award (NOBA) and a Teacher's Choice award. They have published articles in many papers and magazines, many times with their own photography. A must attend program that will be remembered for months to come, especially when you are *Dancing with Nature's* bugs.

At her instigation the Frightened Frog Book was born. Now she has an entire frog population in her home on walls, shelves and probably even in drawers.



#### Three Area Groups Co-Sponsor Gardening Presentation

The *Syracuse Wawasee Garden Club, Chautauqua Wawasee and Wawasee Area Conservancy Foundation* are jointly sponsoring a presentation, discussion and workshop focused on "Gardening in the Face of a changing climate." The workshop will be held at the Oakwood Resort Inn, Syracuse, IN, and will be on February 8, 2020, from 1:00PM – 4:00 PM and led by John Edgerton. The event is open to the public and free to attend.

This Workshop will be led by John Edgerton of Shelbyville, Michigan. John has been doing small-scale farming for forty years, striving always to work in cooperation with nature. In this workshop we plan to explore holistic, resilient, sustainable techniques for gardening and small farming. We will want to look at the importance of healthy soil, healthy plants and helpful insect habitat. We will also want to think about variety selection and other ways to account for climate-related imbalances of diseases and insects. We will share what others in the bioregion are doing to address these issues. Finally, we want to think beyond our own personal garden: We will consider the importance of collaborating and cooperating in our wider communities to build on food security and justice.

John Edgerton lives with his partner and fellow farmer, Amy Newday. Together, they have done both market gardening and community supported agriculture. John has done dozens of workshops on gardening and seed-saving, most recently, at conferences sponsored by the Michigan Food and Farm Alliance, Michigan Integrative Food and Farming Systems, and KEEP GROWING DETROIT. He and Amy have worked with the Inter-Tribal Food Summit to grow out and rematriate several varieties of indigenous Northern flint corn. They also work with a network of northern gardeners to perform growout trials of Upland Rice varieties to determine suitability for our northern bioregion. John and Amy co-taught a course for seniors at Kalamazoo College on "Slow Farming" a form that is committed to limited and appropriate technology. John co-founded a local community garden in Martin, MI. He has also served as a schoolteacher in the Martin Michigan public school, and, long ago, at the Learning Center, a parent-teacher non-public cooperative elementary school, in Fort Wayne.

The Syracuse-Wawasee Garden club was founded in 1961. They currently have 20 members who meet monthly. Their goal is to promote beautification in the town and to learn about gardening and horticulture. They plant and maintain all the town gardens in Syracuse plus 30 hanging baskets lining the streets of the downtown area. #### Syracuse-Wawasee Garden Club

Our craft project for the winter season was luminaries using battery operated candles. We coated a Ball jar with MOD PODGE on the outside of the jar with brushes. Can give a second coat if you want. While the jar was wet, Epson Salt was poured in a shallow pan and we rolled the jar in the salts to cover. They were then decorated with a twine or ribbon bow and choices of pressed holly leaves, bald cypress berries and black alder berries. They were taken home in a plastic bag so they could finish drying. The coated jar can be MOD PODGE sprayed for lasting effect. MOD PODGE can be sanded to a smooth finish if you want.
