TGCI was founded on April 5, 1930. Mrs. H. B. Burnet, president of the Indiana Federation of Art Clubs, called a meeting of all of the garden clubs in Indiana who were connected with the art club. The purpose of that meeting was to create a state organization of garden clubs. Thirty-one persons voted to create the Garden Club of Indiana that day in the central gallery of the John Herron Art Museum.

There are approximately 1,331 members in The Garden Club of Indiana, Inc., with 54 member clubs in seven districts. We are proud members of National Garden Clubs, Inc. and its Central Region.

National Garden Clubs, Inc. is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization whose mission is to provide education, resources, and national networking opportunities for its members to promote the love of gardening, floral design, and civic and environmental responsibility.



CONVENTION RULES 2024 Convention 1. Delegates of the convention shall be in their seats at least five (5) minutes before the opening of each meeting of the session. 2. Each member shall wear his/her identification badge at each function. 3. A delegate wishing to obtain the floor shall give his/her name, city and club represented before the Chair assigns the delegate the floor. 4. Main motions shall be written, signed and sent to the Chair or to the Recording Secretaru. 5. Debate on any one (1) item of business shall be limited to two (2) minutes per speech. Each delegate may speak twice to a question, the second time only after anyone else who wishes to speak has spoken. The use of voting cards is authorized except in the case of a counted vote. 6. Except for the President's Report, Officers' and District Directors' reports shall be limited to three (3) minutes. All other reports shall be limited to two (2) minutes. 7. Pages shall pass notes and messages and deliver written notices to those on the platform. 8. Meals paid for are indicated on individual name tags, which must be shown at the door for admission to the dining area. 9. Cell phones are to be in the off or vibrate position during business meetings, walks, presentations and meal functions. 10. The Chair may deviate from the adopted program as necessary.


SPEAKER BIOS

Fred Sanders

Fred is a lifelong gardener, besting his grandfather at harvest starting by age nine (yet still remaining his grandfather's favorite). He cans his own vegetables every year and prefers to know exactly what is used to control the pests and diseases present in the garden. Fred is a firm believer that we as gardeners are responsible for improving and guiding our garden plots, not forcing them into submission. He has been at The Apple House Home & Garden Center in Terre Haute, Indiana since spring 2016, and has been the Indoor Gardening and Hydroponics Department Manager since spring 2019.

Carrie Tauscher

As an arborist, urban forester and all-around supporter of people finding their passion in trees, or whatever else moves them to be better every day, Carrie Tauscher's personal and professional history is firmly rooted in trees. After graduating with degrees in horticulture and landscape design, she began her career at the Morton Arboretum in Illinois where during her time there she became an International Society of Arboriculture (ISA) Certified Arborist. Her next venture was with the Indiana Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) Department of Forestry as Acting Community & Urban Forestry (CUF) Coordinator. She is a past President of the Indiana Arborist Association and served on the Board of Directors of the Indiana Chapter of ISA. Currently with Crown Hill Cemetery in Indianapolis, Carrie is the Arboretum Director-Crown Hill Heritage Foundation. At Crown Hill, she is essential in helping the urban green space adapt to functioning not only as a cemetery, but as an arboretum and meeting the accreditation requirements necessary across operations to be recognized internationally as a Level II Arboretum through The Interactive Community of Arboreta (ArbNet).





40/40 Save All

Using a tree as the home-base, one person is 'in' and counts to 40 while the other players run and hide. As soon as the person who is 'in' spots someone in their hiding place, she runs back to the tree, shouts out the name of the hider and where they are hiding, and that person is now 'out'. The only way the hider can save herself is if she gets to the tree first and shouts out '40-40 save all' - then everyone is safe and the original person remains 'in'. If all the hiders are found then the first person who was 'out' is the next person to be 'in' and stand guard at the tree.

Hug-a-Tree

This game should be played in an area where there are plenty of trees. Players get into pairs and one person is blind-folded. They are then led to a specific tree by their partner. Here, the blindfolded 'tree-hugger' feels the tree and has to remember, the shape, texture and smell of the tree. Then they are taken back to the starting point, their blindfold is removed and they have to try and identify their tree.

Limber Up and Climb High

Climbing trees is one of the real joys of life. It is a great way to observe and appreciate nature and a great activity for groups. Not to mention totally free! But always stress the importance of safety when it comes to climbing trees. There are certain rules that should be set in stone before any tree climbing begins. Some safety rules should include:

- all branches should be tested before you put weight on them
- always select safe footholds
- don't go higher than a set point (parents should set height restrictions)
- wear a helmet
- always come down the tree facing the trunk
- if you panic: stop, take a deep breath and focus on your hands and feet rather than the ground

Countdown to Five Trees

Similar to 'hide and seek," five trees is a game that needs to be played in an area that has at least five large trees in it. Each tree is given a number from one to five. The person who is 'in' stands with their back to the trees and counts to 20. Each of the other players hides behind a tree so that they cannot be seen. The player who is 'in' turns around and shouts out the number of a tree. Anyone hiding behind that tree is then 'out'. Everyone else is safe. Then the person who is 'in' turns around and counts to 20 again, while those still playing run and hide behind a different tree. And so on, until there is only one hider left!
