Native and Invasive Species

The Callery Pear

It is spring and soon these trees with their showy, though odorous, white blossoms will be blooming all across the state of Indiana – in our yards, along our streets, in our parks, along the roads, open woodlands, and woodland borders, fence rows, wetlands, and fallow fields.

They are beautiful. They are Smelly. They are **invasive**.

The Callery Pear (Pryus calleryana) is a medium-sized, rapid growing, deciduous tree that was introduced to the US from Asia in the early 1900's. The "Bradford" and "Chanticleer" are two of the most common cultivars.

They have been a popular ornamental tree due to their showy white flowers in early spring and colorful fall foliage. The species adapts to full or partial sun, moist to dry conditions, and any soil type, is somewhat drought tolerant, and was originally thought to be sterile. These characteristics, which made the tree very attractive for urban landscapes, are the same ones that make it highly invasive. Its cultivars can cross-pollinate to produce fertile fruit, which is eaten by birds, who disperse the seed widely, creating dense tickets that displace native plants and trees that can't compete for light, water, soil and space. It has also turned out to be a very weak tree, easily damaged by ice and wind.

Despite being ranked as a highly invasive plant species, the Callery/ Bradford pear is still used across Indiana as an ornamental tree in landscaping and sold at nurseries. Please do not buy this tree and do discourage its use in your communities. Choose one of the many native trees that produce white, and sometimes fragrant, flowers in the spring with leaves turning a vibrant red/orange color in the fall. Consider the Native Dogwood. It's even celebrated every year in a number of towns with "Dogwood Festivals." How about the Native Serviceberry, Native Wild Plum or Wild Prairie Crabapple?

Check out these and other native trees at your local nursery. Then do your own research to make sure the tree you choose is not considered invasive in your ecoregion.

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Spring into Action!

You've been planning all winter, and you can practically taste Spring! There may be a few more weeks before the growing year really kicks off, so you have time to consider adding a few pollinator-friendly Indiana native plants to your plans.

Yellow Giant Hyssop (Agastache nepetoides) **Indian hemp** aka Prairie dogbane (Apocynum cannabinum) Thistle (Cirsium sp.) Wild carrots aka Queen Anne's Lace (Daucus carota) Purple Coneflower (Echinacea sp.) Horseweed (Erigeron canadensis) **Spotted Joe-Pye weed** (Eupatorium maculatum) **Common boneset** (Eupatorium perfoliatum) Blazing stars (Liatris sp.) Goldenrod (Solidago sp.) Red clover (Trifolium pratense) **Tall ironweed** (Vernonia altissima) Swamp Milkweed (Asclepias incarnata) Poke Milkweed aka Tall Milkweed (Asclepias exaltata) Whorled Milkweed (Asclepias verticillata) Coneflowers (Echinacea spp.), Columbine (Aquilegia spp.) Garden phlox (P. paniculata) Black-eyed Susan (Rudbeckia spp.) Aster (Symphyotrichum spp.)

Once you decide on which plants to add, you need to choose between seeds and plants. Both are good, but each has it's own drawbacks.



Seeds are economical but require more time and attention. To add seeds this spring you'll be more successful if you start the seeds indoors in preparation for transplanting later. It is best to plant the seeds as early as possible, but make sure that you plant after the last frost. In particular, milkweed seeds require cold-treated before planting.

Alternately, you can choose to purchase native plant seedlings in plug form, which will be more of an investment, but bring pollinators to your yard this spring. The best source of plugs are local independent nurseries and native plant sales.

Share this information with your club. Work together to create pollinator-friendly landscaping such as setting up pocket pollinator gardens in each member's yard or patio.

Alternatively, your club could invest time or resources to help maintain or support a butterfly habitat in your district. Document your planning and progress and submit an application for 2024's Katrina Vollmer Butterfly Traveling Silver Tray and Certificate of Award before December 1, 2024.

TREES why do trees lose their leaves?

Deciduous trees lose their leaves in winter and essentially go to sleep similar to how some animals hibernate during the winter months. For trees, this is called dormancy. The tree sends most of its vital nutrients to the roots, where they are stored and the tree spends less energy through the winter. Moisture is conserved within the trunk and keeps the tree from drying out. Wind blows through the bare branches putting less strain on the tree which is a serious concern during winter storms and harsh weather.


