# Letter from the President



**O**n this 17 ° winter day I am enjoying watching the geese formation glide down the Tippecanoe River. I am inspired by the geese and the following story and how it relates to the Garden Club of Indiana as we move into the 96th year of TGCI.

## The Goose Story – A Teamwork Lesson

When you see geese flying along in “V” formation, you might consider what science has discovered as to why they fly that way. As each bird flaps its wings, it creates an uplift for the bird immediately following. By flying in “V” formation, the whole flock adds at least 71 percent greater flying range than if each bird flew on its own. People who share a common direction and sense of community can get where they are going more quickly and easily because they are traveling on the thrust of one another.

When a goose falls out of formation, it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of trying to go it alone — and quickly gets back into formation to take advantage of the lifting power of the bird in front. If we have as much sense as a goose, we will stay with those people who are headed the same way we are.

When the head goose gets tired, it rotates back in the wing and another goose flies point. It is

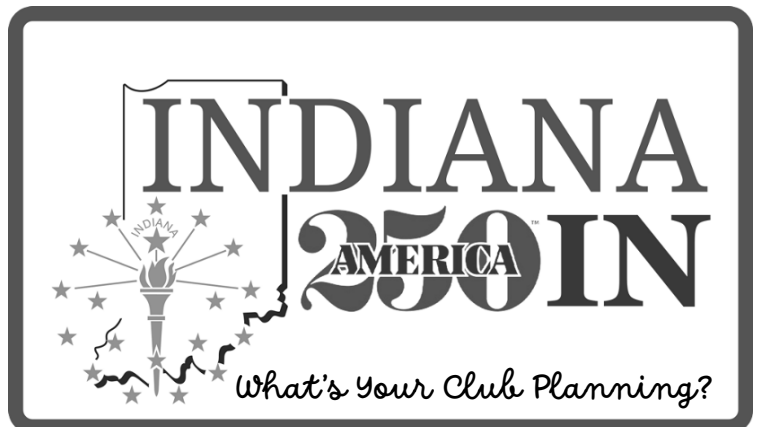
sensible to take turns doing demanding jobs, whether with people or with geese flying south. If bylaws or standing rules prevent the job exchange, at least support the leader. Geese honk from behind to encourage those up front to keep up their speed. What messages do we give when we honk from behind?

Finally — and this is important — when a goose gets sick or is wounded by gunshot, and falls out of formation, two other geese fall out with that goose and follow it down to lend help and protection. They stay with the fallen goose until it is able to fly or until it dies, and only then do they launch out on their own, or with another formation to catch up with their group.

At present I am head of the “V” please use the sense of a goose and stand by with me and each other to keep TGCI a great organization.

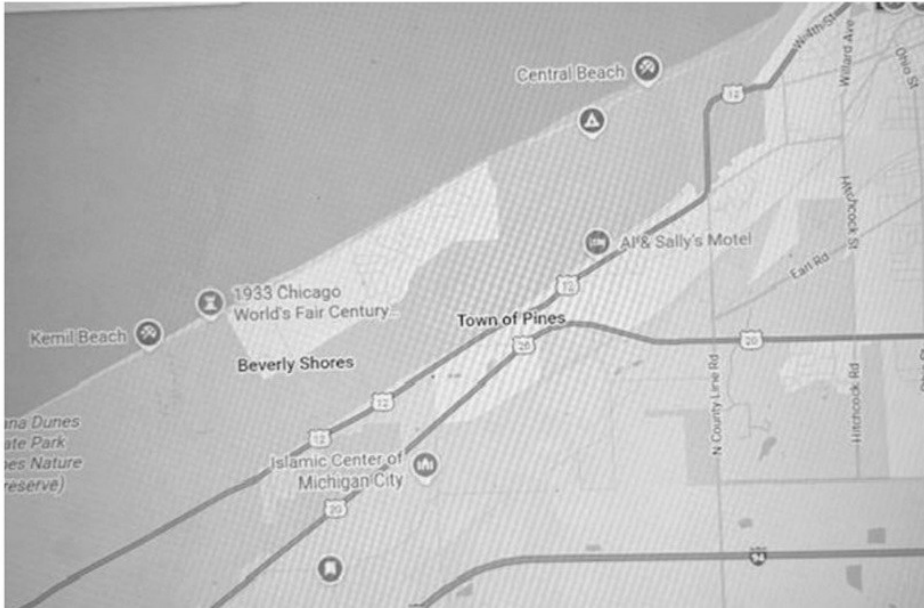

# Endangered Species



**P**iping Plover, a small sand-colored shorebird that nests on beaches and mudflats, known for its distinctive single breast band, orange legs and short bill, encounters numerous challenges that threaten their survival.

Their habitat is on sandy beaches and shorelines of large water like the Great Lakes, Atlantic Coast, and Missouri River system, and winters on coasts and mudflats. According to Karl Schneider at the *Indianapolis Star*, The Great Lakes population has

been listed as endangered since 1986. "The Great Lakes population's bands are even more visible than those on other piping plovers because every year researchers tag new bands on hatchlings to denote when and where they hatched, according to bird conservancy group Audubon. They will wear the bands for the rest of their lives. The piping plover lives around five years."

These shorebirds forage for food by running in short bursts, then pause to peck at food sometimes shuffling one foot to startle prey. Their diet consists of insects, marine worms, and small crustaceans.

The nesting of the Piping Plover consists of the birds building a shallow scrape on the sand, often marked with pebbles. Chicks are able to walk and feed themselves shortly after hatching. The male often takes over care of the young after the female leaves.

Predators like foxes, raccoons, and cats are attracted to beaches by human activities, leading to increased predation on eggs, chicks, and adults. Climate change also poses a significant threat by altering coastal ecologies and affecting food availability. Conservation efforts are crucial to protect these endangered birds and ensure their survival.

According to Karl Schneider, "A 2005 plan by the conservation team set a goal of at least 150 breeding pairs surviving five consecutive years for the birds to be taken off the endangered species list. The plan also says the federal government should develop long-term funding and management agreements to ensure the population remains protected. While Indiana does not have a project focused on piping plovers, the DNR Wildlife Research Supervisor Theresa Bordenkecher says the agency is considering starting one in the future," .

The conservation efforts now include closing off nesting areas, using fences, public awareness campaigns and habitat restoration.

# Trees



**I**n February trees are mostly dormant in Indiana. Winter burn is still a possibility so keep protecting tender trees during this month and going into the month of March.

This is an excellent time to properly prune branches and start your spring tree planting plans and preparations. Avoid tree topping which contributes to long term damage. Schedule clearing and other maintenance projects before the April 1st “Bat Window” begins!!!

Indiana’s “Bat Window” begins April 1st and runs through September 30th. This restrictive window is in place to protect the endangered Indiana Bat and Northern Long-Eared Bat during their active summer roosting and maternity periods according to

INDOT Policy. The October 1st through March 31st window is the inactive hibernating season for these bats.

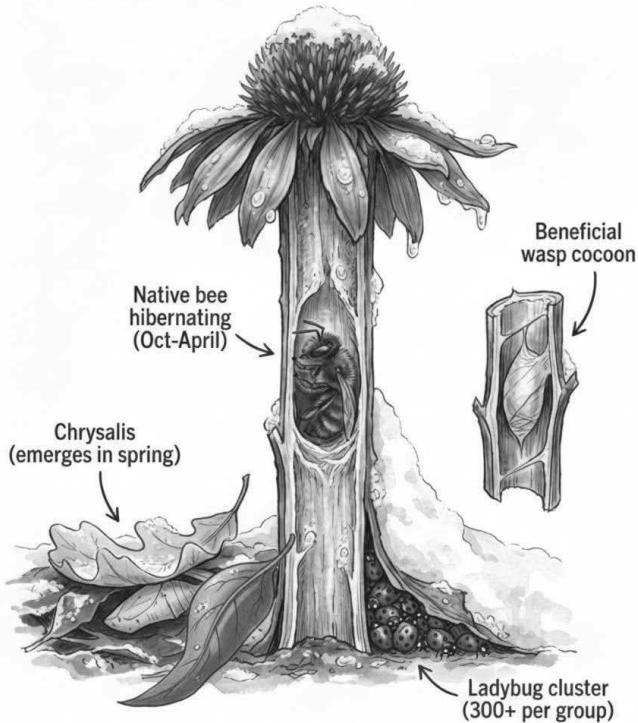

**The shears can wait. My life can't.**

Delay winter garden cleanup until May to support overwintering pollinators! Traditional winter cleanup can harm beneficial insects like native bees and butterflies, which rely on dead plant material for hibernation. Cutting back plants too early destroys their habitats and reduces natural pest control for spring. Here's a better approach:

**Fall (Oct-Nov):**

- Leave perennials and leaf litter.
- Avoid cutting hollow-stemmed plants.

**Winter (Dec-Mar):**

- Keep all plant material standing.
- Resist the urge to tidy up.

**Spring (Late Apr-May):**

- Wait until daytime temps hit 50-55°F before cutting stems.
- Leave some cut stems in your garden for late-emerging insects.

A "messy" garden is a functional habitat providing insulation for hibernating insects and food for birds. Plus, it enhances garden health by boosting pollination and pest control! For those worried about appearance, focus cleanup on front areas while leaving borders for wildlife.
